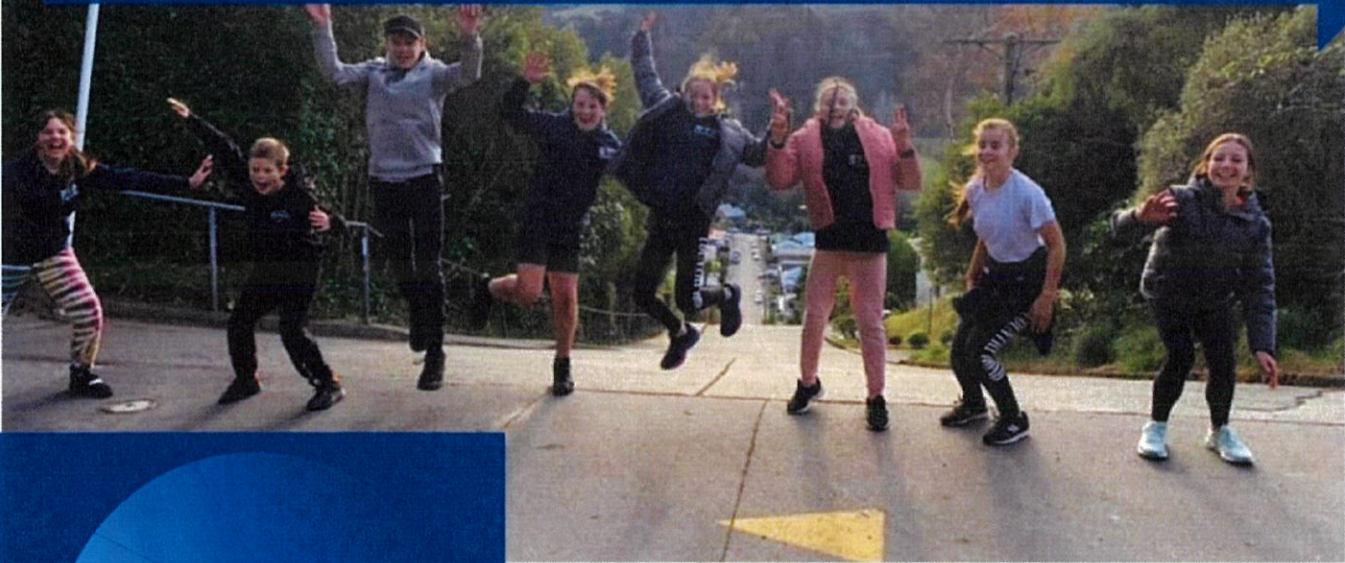

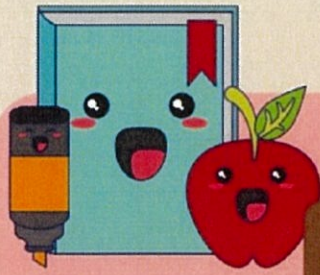

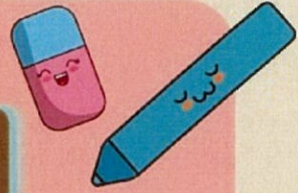
Village - Our People

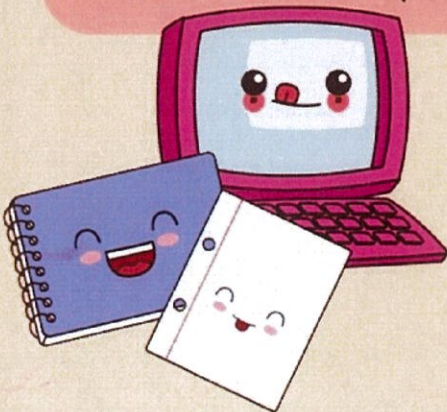
On Friday I went to Cross Country. I was as cold as an ice block. While I waited for my race, I watched the others.

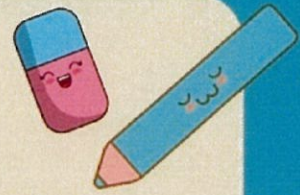
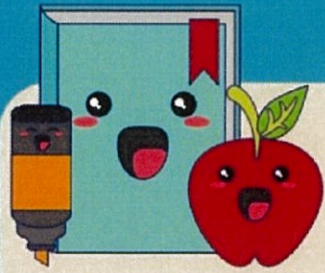

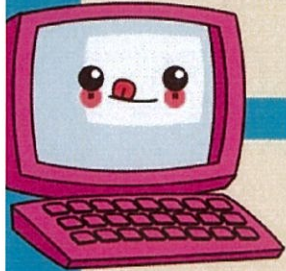
During the rugby game, I tackled, was in scrums, and scored tries.

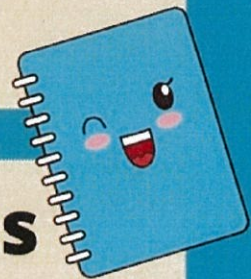

The Sea

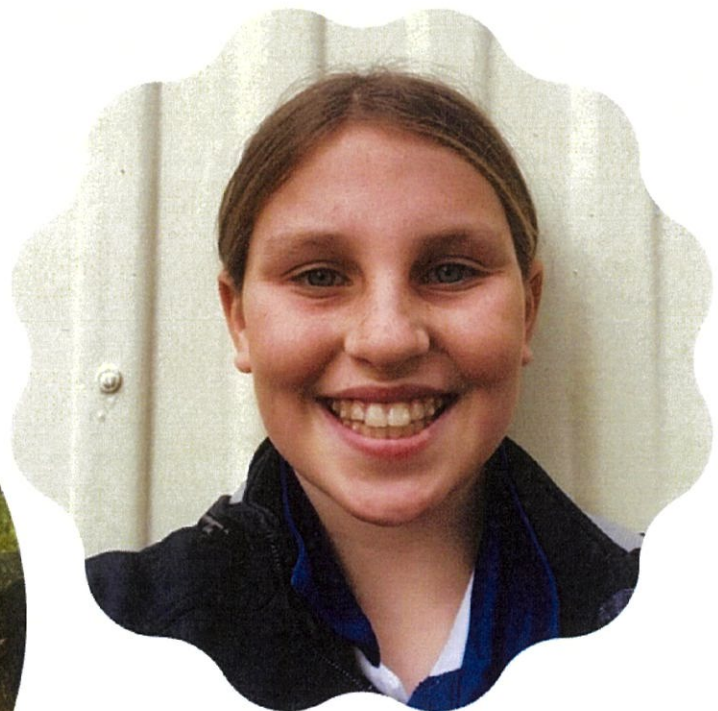

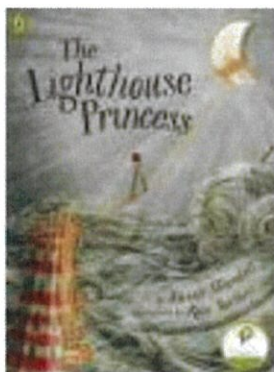

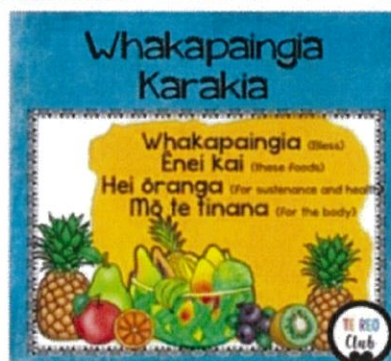
The Lighthouse Princess reminds me of The Paper Bag Princess.

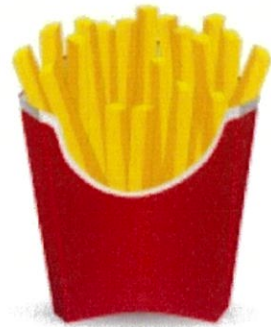

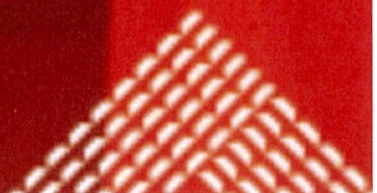
