Miharo Murihiku Polyfest - By the time you receive this newsletter, we will have completed our performance on the stage at Miharo Murihiku Polyfest at Stadium Southland. Thank you to our families and friends for supporting our showcase of waiata, poi, and haka. Our kapa haka performance reflected the mana of our kura and our people.

NZC Mathematics - Numicon - As part of the NZ Mathematics Curriculum Refresh, our school has eagerly accepted the Numicon resources to support teaching and learning programmes. Numicon is a structured mathematics programme and manipulative, designed to help children develop a strong understanding of number and mathematical concepts. It uses a system of colorful, shaped plates with holes that represent numbers, allowing children to visualize and manipulate numbers in a concrete way. This multi-sensory approach helps children build a solid foundation for mathematical learning, particularly in areas like number recognition, relationships, and problem-solving.

Our team is excited to have this resource within our classrooms for use. Kowhai and Matai are further developing their knowledge of the pedagogy to support their professional learning for use in teaching and learning programmes.

Carpet - Next week we have new carpet being installed throughout our classrooms as part of the upgrades the Government are completing. This will involve each class relocating for approximately 1&1/2 days while the installation is taking place. Fortunately, we can utilise the multi-purpose building and administration block. At this stage, it looks like Kowhai from Monday pm and all of Tuesday, followed by Matai from Wednesday and ½ of Thursday, then onto Totara Thursday pm and all of Friday. Rata class are likely to need to relocate the following week on Monday and Tuesday.
