2022 HVP School Organisation

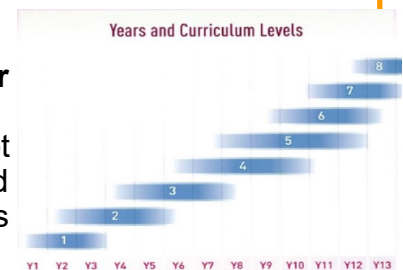
Here is the structure of classes for next year. Please note that there is a change of year level groupings as we provide flexibility within classes.

Frequently Asked Questions

How do teachers cater for the range of abilities across two year levels?

The New Zealand Curriculum Levels range across 2 – 3 years. It is not a 1 year level for 1 age group, instead all curriculum levels are spread across 2 – 3 year levels. This diagram shows how curriculum levels typically relate to years at school.



Why change from the current age level classes?

There are currently variances between year levels which does not allow any flexibility of staffing. Multi level classes allow equitable class numbers and a greater spread of student needs throughout combined year levels.

Won't it be much harder for teachers to have a greater range of ages in their classes?

Due to staggered enrolments on a child's 5th birthday there has always been a range of at least 12 – 14 months in any classroom. New Zealand teacher's often ability group for maths and literacy; they also "flexi group" for specific needs.

Are children "held back" if they are one of the older students in the multi level class?

Teachers assess individual students, groups are then based on need or ability "stage not age" e.g. Year 6 student may be at the end of Level 2 for writing but a Year 5 student may be Level 3.

Will you cross group across the multi level?

Current research (and our own staff experiences) show that teacher / pupil relationships and knowledge of individual learner needs are fostered by having the consistency of the same class teacher (i.e. not moving class for maths).

Why don't you "stream" classes?

Unlike some high schools where some subjects are streamed, New Zealand Primary teachers are expected (and trained) to teach multi level classrooms. At primary level teaching and learning programmes are developed through a wide range of experiences across all the learning areas of the curriculum with a focus on literacy and numeracy along with the development of school values and key competencies.

What about the difference in maturity between two year levels?

Regardless of their age, students who have well developed social skills are role models for others. These students are not necessarily the oldest in a class but may even be the year level

younger. Some teachers specifically group students to teach or model our key competencies or to reinforce social / cooperative skills. The culture of high expectation is set by the teacher (regardless of year level). The analogy of a sports team, which may have several age levels - but huge variance in skill, resilience or player attitudes, will perform as a team depending on the coach's expectations

Term 4, Week 9

Next week we finish the year with the Ride Well Programme. This aims to equip students with the skills they need to enjoy riding their bikes, whether for recreation or transport. Funding for the programme is provided by the Southland District Council, and Waka Kotahi - New Zealand Transport Agency; and is presented by Cycling Southland.

Students develop balance and bike control skills for:

- starting/stopping and turning
- riding with one hand to signal
- looking all around (including behind)

They also learn how to check that their bikes and helmets are roadworthy and ready to ride, and learn how their choice of clothing can affect their experience on the bike.

Our sessions are for Tuesday 14th and Wednesday 15th December with each class completing a 45-60 minute session daily as a class.

Students with bikes are asked to bring their own bikes and helmets for sessions. Cycle Southland will provide bikes and helmets for students that don't have their own.

Bikes can be dropped to Hauroko Valley Primary School on Sunday, Monday or Tuesday morning before sessions. The Year 7&8 students will have their second session on Tuesday 15th December 9.00am-10.00am before heading down to Waiau Area School for their final Technology session.

We have either the tennis court and the swimming pool to house bikes and the ability to lock both of these places.

Our official last day for 2021 is Wednesday 15th December with buses running as per usual. Have a great week.

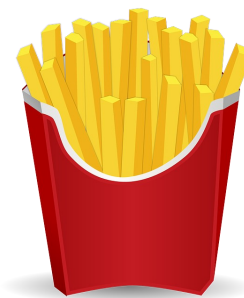

Reading Feature

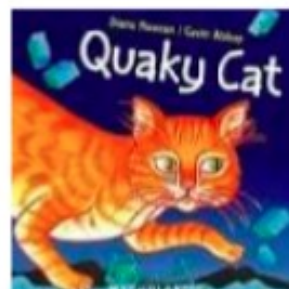
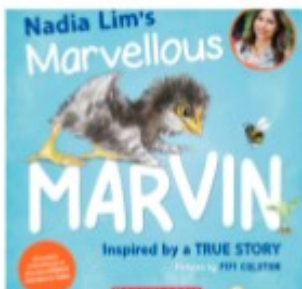
This week we feature stories of animals from around New Zealand.
