He also did some research and found out some answers for your wonderings...



We read rocks are made of different recuipes or mixtures of materials.

How does this happen?

Rocks are made up of different materials like tiny minerals and other stuff that come together in different ways. Sometimes, they form when molten rock cools down and hardens or when tiny bits get squished together for a long, long time.

How do scientists know the age of rocks?

Scientists figure out the age of rocks using cool methods. They might use things like the radioactive elements or study the layers of rocks to make educated guesses about how old they are. Sometimes, fossils in the rocks help, too!

Are rocks really used in things like glass, pencils, and toothpase?
Yep, rocks are used in lots of things! Some rocks have minerals that are
perfect for making glass. Others have graphite for pencils or minerals
like fluorite that make toothpaste stronger.

How are gems made inside rocks?

Gems are like the rock's bling! they form inside rocks because of crazy conditions like heat and pressure. Sometimes, they take forever to form, and they're super rare and shiny, like diamonds.

What exactly are minerals?

Minerals are the building blocks of rocks. They're super tiny and have specific chemical compositions. Quartz, for example, is a mineral that's in lots of rocks!

Can rocks become extinct?

Rocks don't exactly go extinct, but some kinds become really, really rare because they aren't made anymore. They might have needed certain conditions that don't happen now.

Are some rocks stronger than others and if so why?

Definitely! Some rocks are tougher because of their ingredients and how they formed. For example, granite is super strong, while shale can break apart easily.

Why are some rocks more valuable than others?

Some rocks are more valuable because they're rare or because they have something special in them. Like diamonds or rubies—they're rare and look super pretty, making them more valuable than common rocks.
