Last week we farewelled Harold, and this week we said 'all the best' to Xidhrie and Chad and their families, as they leave Hauroko Valley and head off on new adventures. At this time, we haven't received any notifications of incoming students, which may be part of dairy farm movements. If you are aware of any families moving into the Hauroko Valley Primary School zone, please let us know. This helps us to manage numbers in classes.

To end this week, teaching staff are engaging in Ministry of Education Professional Learning to build our knowledge and skills of the Refreshed Maths Curriculum. Thanks to Lorraine, MOE Curriculum Advisor, for supporting us with our learning. Last year, we had to opt for resources, so we elected for Numicon to support learners with materials to start their number journey. We have sourced Maths No Problem for our older learners as this aligns with the NZC and provides workbook options. However, both resources are tools for us to use across levels and curriculum as we utilise a range of teaching and learning methods, as per usual.

Currently, our teaching staff is completing mid-year reports.

There is a change from reporting to the following Years and Curriculum Levels. We now move from achievement levels to phases of learning (as below).

Phase 1 (Years 0-3) - Thriving in environments rich in literacy and numeracy.

Phase 2 (Years 4-6) - Expanding horizons of knowledge and collaborating.

Phase 3 (Years 7&8) - Seeing ourselves in the wider world and advocating with and for others.

The Refreshed Curriculum is long overdue, as we have been using the same curriculum since 2007. The refresh enables us to apply what we now know. (When you know better, you do better.) This includes knowledge of the Science of Learning (how the brain learns), and the importance of what skills 21st-century learners need has led to some changes. The refreshed curriculum is underpinned by 5 characteristics of how we learn:


- We learn best when we experience a sense of belonging in the learning environment and feel valued and supported.
- A new idea or concept is always interpreted through, and learned in association with, existing knowledge.
- Establishing knowledge in a well-organised way in long-term memory reduces students' cognitive load when building on that knowledge. It also enables them to apply and transfer the knowledge.
- Our social and emotional well-being directly impacts our ability to learn new knowledge.
- Motivation is critical for well-being and engagement in learning.

We are on track with our strategic goals as we focus on wellbeing, student progress and achievement in reading, writing, and mathematics, and the connections we make with people and places through curriculum opportunities.

Currently, we have a case of school sores or impetigo. Please refer to the information included in the newsletter for symptoms, how to treat and the length of time students should remain away from school.

The book started to move fast and then...


